Mildmay Hospital: From our Historic Beginnings to Modern Care

internationally renowned for

its specialised care, particularly for
those suffering from HIV-related

neurological conditions.

One of few objects we retain from the original hospital is our clock, positioned above the main entrance, just as in 1892.

Today, Mildmay Hospital is a key partner of the NHS, operating from a modern, purpose-built facility on its original site, officially opened by Prince Harry in 2015. Since 2020, Mildmay has also been a critical resource for London's homeless population, offering medical care and rehabilitation services for those in desperate need. In 2022, we again expanded our services to include postdetox stabilisation, helping people regain control of their lives.
